ARCHIPELAGO ADVENTURES

Sail away with a mix of rest, rejuvenation and a bit of bite, writes Belinda Jackson.

nto yoga and relaxation but also up for an encounter with a Komodo dragon? This adventure ticks all the hot trend boxes: small-boat cruising, wellness focus and exploring the Indonesian archipelago.

Indonesia's traditional long-range fishing
yacht, the phinisi, gets a beauty overhaul by

Hall takes her wellness weeks east with
a series of new, six-night Escape Haven
Voyages sailing through the Flores Sea.
"This journey unites rest and rejuvenation
with action and exhibitaration" she says.

The week starts with two nights at Hall's The Palm Tree House in Canggu to begin the process of unwinding, with spa treatments and plenty of pool time, before flying to Labuan Bajo, where guests board the 34-metre phinisi for five days' sailing

through the Komodo archipelago.
Blend beach yoga and dawn meditation with kayaking or hiking the spines of the archipelago's islands, pausing to picnic on pink-sand beaches.

Blend beach yoga and dawn meditation with kayaking or hiking. Highlights include seeing Komodo dragons on Rincar Island, snorkelling, swimming and unlimited diving with the dive master amongst dolphins, rays and corals, or visit to the resident massages or a deciside dashed

the resident masseuse or a deckside daybed. The five ensuite cabins accommodate up to 10 guests, cared for by staff also including the ship's host and chef.

There are six departures, four of which

are for women only.

The first voyage takes place May 15, with

monthly departures until September. Twin share costs from \$US3500 a person, with triple share and deluxe singles available. Includes two nights at The Palm Tree House in Canggu and return airfares from Denpasar to Komodo airport, on Labuan Bajo, Flores. See escapehaven.com

HOW TO NOT GET LOST IN THE GRAND BAZAAR



ALNITEMIZ

A repository of treasure and trinkets, the 570-year-old Grand Bazaar is Istanbul's greatest calling card. Resident Ozgu Alnitemiz is the Celestyal Cruises country manager (Turkey). This year, Celestyal's new Eclectic Aegean route adds Istanbul and the Grand Bazaar to its Greek Islands itinerary. celestyalcruises. com

This historic building, Kapali Carsi in Turkish, has more than 4000 shops under 15 domes, and has eight main doors. When you enter the Nuruosmaniye Gate, beside the Nuruosmaniye mosque, the first shop on the left is No.1, the first shop on the right is No.2, so the shops on the left are odd numbers and shops on the right are even numbers. You can track these numbers to avoid getting lost.

STEP TWO Open between 8.30am and 7pm, the bazaar is busy at all hours of the day, but less so in in the early hours, when the tour groups are visiting the historical sites. They usually visit the bazaar later in the day, after 3pm. The bazaar is closed on Sundays, which makes Saturdays the busiest day of the week.

STEPTHREE

You can find peace in the bazaar's hans, which are courtyards traditionally dedicated to one craft; I recommend 'Kucuk Valide Han' and 'Buyuk Valide Han', built in 1651. Zincinli Han, with its marble fountain, is regarded as the most authentic han in the Grand Bazaar.

STEP FOUR

Gramofon Baba (Gramophone Dad) is a store that absolutely must be kept alive: Mr Mehmet is the last gramophone repairman in Istanbul and his shop is the most admirable place in Grand Bazaar (Lutfullah Sokak, No. 16, G). Sagtan is where Mr Hayrullah made jewellery for movies such as Troya, The Other Boleyn Girl and Suleyman the Magnificent. It's an oasis for the enthusiast (No. 25/3 in the Astarci Han). Handmade Turkish carpets are the most memorable gifts from Turkey, but be very careful as generally there are no price tags and not so serious shops may give random prices after looking at your shoes or watch.

Be sure to take a coffee break. Sark Kahvesi (literally, 'Orient Coffeehouse') is the most authentic cafe in the bazaar, and serves Turkish coffee, of course (Nuruosmanive No. 75-77). You should also taste Sahin Usta's doner (beside the Kiliclar entrance), the meatballs in famous Sultanahmet Koftecisi (Divan Yolu St, No. 12), and for kebabs, I suggest Sura Kebap (Divan Yolu St, No. 45).
